Context of 200 Years of Catholic Education in Australia

Catholic schools are a vital part of Australia's education landscape. From humble beginnings almost 200 years ago, Catholic schools have grown to become the nation's largest provider of education, serving some 768,000 students and their families. Today, Australia's 1,751 Catholic schools educate one in five students and employ more than 98,000 staff, making Catholic education a key partner in the delivery of quality schooling with the government and independent sectors. Catholic Education in Australia has a vibrant and challenging history. Religious, social, economic, and political factors have all influenced the growth and unique story of Catholic Education in Australia. From the original desire for Catholic children to be taught within their own faith setting, to the large number of Religious imported to teach our children as a result of the Education Acts and cessation in funding, to the vibrant and modern Catholic schools we see today, the purpose of providing faith filled communities dedicated to being Christ-centred has not waivered.

The national theme, "Faith in the future" reflects the core purpose of Catholic education to form students in their faith, and to provide an education that enables our graduates to make a meaningful contribution to the world. The theme reflects our commitment to build on the great work of those who have come before us and to provide a Catholic education for future generations of students in a world that is rapidly changing and poses new challenges for Catholic school communities. Yet, we have faith that we can face these challenges and continue to build on, and strengthen, our mission of Catholic education. (NCEC, 2021).

The image included is the logo for Celebrating 200 years of Catholic Education.


Faith in the Future

- The Christian Cross representing the faith dimension of Catholic Schools and our mission of service in Christ.
- The Southern Cross and map of Australia representing the Great South Land of Australia
- Dots are used as a key design element, connecting to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and our Australian heritage
- The colours burnt red and yellow represent the desert in the heart of the Australian outback, contrasting the

deep blue representing the Southern sky and ocean surrounding our continent. (NCEC, 2021).
