A reflection

Among the 36 Saints named Doctors of the Church, there are just four women – four remarkable women! While small in number, these women have been recognised for their significant contribution to theology or doctrine.

Three have been remembered and celebrated in recent or up-coming Feast Days: Catherine of Siena (1347 -1380) – April 29; Hildegard of Bingen (1098 - 1179) – September 17; Therese of Lisieux (1873 - 1897) – October 1; and Teresa of Avila (1515 - 1582) – October 15.

In her book, The time is Now: A Call to Uncommon Courage, Sr Joan Chittister reminds us that the prophet's responsibility is "to sound the alarm" when our institutions lose their way and live to preserve themselves, rather than the common good. The Church's women doctors were and continue to be creative and prophetic spiritual guides whose voices from the past can 'sound the alarm' to give us purpose and focus for our contemporary journey.

Catherine of Siena "Start being brave about everything. Drive out darkness and spread light. Don't look at your weaknesses. Realize instead that in Christ crucified you can do everything."

Hildegard of Bingen "The Word is living, being, spirit, all verdant greening, all creativity. This Word manifests itself in every creature."

Therese of Lisieux "Without love, deeds, even the most brilliant, count as nothing."

Teresa of Avila "May today there be peace within.

May you trust God that you are exactly where you are meant to be.

May you not forget the infinite possibilities that are born of faith.

May you use those gifts that you have received, and pass on the love that has been given to you.

May you be content knowing you are a child of God.

Let this presence settle into your bones, and allow your soul the freedom to sing, dance, praise and love.

It is there for each and every one of us."
