Introduction

The Feast of the Assumption, celebrated on August 15th acknowledges the Catholic teaching that Mary, born free of original sin, was assumed, body and soul to be with her Son and God in Heaven. Mary is a Saint that is honoured by believers, both past and present in the Catholic Tradition. She is considered not only to be the Mother of Jesus but Mother of the Church.

Scripture – Gospel reading: Mary Visits Elizabeth [Luke 1: 39-56] 39 In those days Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country, 40 where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. 41 When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leaped in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit 42 and exclaimed with a loud cry, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. 43 And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me? 44 For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leaped for joy. 45 And blessed is she who believed that there would be $^{[a]}$ a fulfillment of what was spoken to her by the Lord."

We may be familiar with the first part of this Reading, as the Visitation, where Mary sets off to visit her cousin Elizabeth. The second part is known as the Magnificat and is taught within the Religious Education Curriculum in Year 5 in Primary School and Year 10 in Secondary. These beautiful words from Mary remind us of the many women in the Bible who have sung songs of Praise to God, including Hannah, who like Mary, faced many obstacles and hardships in her life. However, both these women had the gift of faith, the strength of spirit and the foresight to know that love, gratitude, and humility is one of the most beautiful ways to show gratitude and love to God.

The assumption can place many images and questions in our minds. When I consider the Assumption and Mary being lifted into Heaven, I get a glimpse of hope in my world. A world which can at times be so full of fear and daunting. In the same way God shares a bountiful love with Mary, God shares that same love with me, and as God lifts Mary towards Heaven, I too can be assisted by God to be lifted out of the heaviness that the everyday world can bring. When I think and pray in this way I am lifted above my fear and doubt and because I am lifted, I can look down and see my life and supposed problems with new eyes, from new heights and I can gain a sense of the bigger picture. The Assumption can be for us a reminder that God is there, to lift us up, to help us see clearly and to give comfort when hope may be hard to come by and we are starting to see the world in ways other than the way God intended.
