The Easter Vigil

In the Catholic tradition, the Paschal Triduum concludes with the Easter Vigil and the Church replaces her sense of mourning with a sense of anticipation. The celebration of the Easter Vigil is unlike any other celebration in the Church year! There are typically four parts to the Vigil: The Solemn Beginning of the Vigil, Liturgy of the Word, Baptismal Liturgy and Liturgy of the Eucharist- each contributing to the grandeur of this night of nights for the Church.

Scripture


Psalm 32:4-7.12-13.20.22 R: The earth is full of the goodness of the Lord.

The Easter Vigil includes a large amount of Scripture compared to the volume Catholic masses typically have included in the liturgies of the Church. There are seven readings and Psalms, followed by the Epistle and then the Gospel. Whilst the Scripture included in this prayer is one of the options for the first Psalm, it is likely not one that is commonly heard. Nevertheless, the message of the response is an important one for believers to remember in the wake of the devastation of Good Friday and the state of the world at present: the earth is full of the goodness of the Lord!

The events of Good Friday can often be a time when some might question the goodness of the Lord; it is hard to reconcile the death of Jesus as being necessary for good to prevail. So too, when we hear the news and pause and consider what is happening in our world and present. It can be hard to reconcile the events and experiences as reflecting that the earth is full of the goodness of the Lord. The Easter Vigil, however, reminds Catholics that this goodness does exist and that no matter what has already happened, they should anticipate the goodness of the Lord to prevail once more. As Christians around the world prepare to celebrate the Resurrection and Easter Season, they remember that the earth is indeed full of God's goodness and can bring joy to followers of Christ.

Call to Action

- Attend an Easter Vigil at your local parish.

Talk about how fire represents that Jesus is the light of the world. He brings light to the darkness and new life to a sleeping world. What are some other symbols of resurrection? (Water, the colour white, the transformation of a butterfly, Easter eggs, etc.).
- Pray the **Exultet** together.
