Context

Shrove Tuesday

Shrove Tuesday has several monikers around the world. In French speaking countries, it is known as 'Mardi Gras' and in a growing number of countries it is referred to as 'Pancake Day'. Of course, the term 'Shrove Tuesday' is still widely used by people of the Catholic faith. It occurs on the day prior to Ash Wednesday, which signals the beginning of the Season of Lent. Shrove Tuesday's association with pancakes refers to the 'emptying' of any extravagant foods in fridges and pantries in preparation for fasting during the Lenten season. It is a feast before the fast and a day that many believers begin to prepare spiritually for, with the imminent approach of Lent. Whilst this day of preparation can be associated with a focus on penance, that is, seeking forgiveness for our shortcomings, Shrove Tuesday also presents an opportunity to prepare for the Season of Lent through the practice of contemplation.

Contemplation requires minimising distractions for focus, which I suggest is an excellent way to prepare for Ash Wednesday and the Lenten journey ahead! Some Catholics contemplate the Scriptures writings, while others may gaze upon artists' impressions of the Holy Face of Jesus.

Let's start with some scripture writings...

Reflection

Interestingly, in the Catholic Lectionary, Shrove Tuesday does not have its own allocated Scripture readings, as is the case for most significant events in the Church. Instead, you may find wisdom writings about God's love for humanity from the mass of the day. This year, Shrove Tuesday falls in the Sixth Week of Ordinary Time, and listeners will hear Scripture from the Letter of St James. This ancient text provides an apt reminder for believers to remain steadfast through the spiritual trials of the Lenten journey towards personal growth.

For faithful followers, the beginnings of Lent can seem daunting when we consider the changes required over the next 40 days. Maintaining a fast from something we may be quite dependent on, increasing our prayer routine and finding the means for almsgiving in the current financial climate may seem overwhelming when starting out. 'Fasting' can take many forms, and sometimes it helps to think of it as gifting others with your time, talents, and treasure. Start where you can. Inevitably, there will be longing through difficult times, yet this sharpens our focus on God and moves our minds and hearts away from the 'noise' we are accustomed to.

This clarity can contribute to a 'conversion of heart' as we strive for better habits, attitudes and thoughts that call us into right relationship for closeness and contentment with God. The opening line Happy are those who remain faithful under trials reminds people of faith that staying the course with God is where happiness can be found.

Let's consider too, the practice of gazing at religious artefacts. Contemplating the Holy Face of Jesus is associated with two miraculous images: Veronica's Veil and the Holy Shroud of Turin. The Catholic Church acknowledges the Feast of the Holy Face of Jesus on Shrove Tuesday each year. In the Gospel of John, Jesus says to Philip, Whoever has seen me as seen the Father. Thus, by contemplating the Holy Face of Jesus on Shrove Tuesday, it prepares us to grow closer to both Jesus and God in this Lenten season.

Prayer

On this Shrove Tuesday, you may like to meditate on the words of Pope St. John Paul II even, and call upon the Holy Face of Jesus to guide you through this Lenten season:

Holy Face, which looks at us and searches for us, kind and merciful,

You who call us to conversion and invite us for the fullness of love, we adore and bless you.

In Your luminous Face, we learn to love and to be loved, to find freedom and reconciliation, to promote peace, which radiates from you and leads to you.

Amen.
