### St Joseph

Whilst we hear very little of Saint Joseph in the gospels, he is celebrated twice in the Church year. Today he is celebrated as the spouse of Mary and in May, we celebrate the Feast of St Joseph the Worker. As the spouse of Mary, Joseph provides us with an example of faith in ordinary experiences. As Sr Monica Cavanagh, Congregational Leader of the Sisters of Saint Joseph, reminds us, what is told of Joseph highlights the importance of faithful listening to God's word spoken in the ordinary experiences of one's life and the need to respond with generosity and courage. Joseph was an ordinary man who received an extraordinary calling from God and in doing so he teaches us to trust in God's providence quietly at work in our world and more importantly at work within our own families.

This scripture reminds us that even though we may have carefully constructed plans of our own, they do not always match the plans that God has for us. Joseph was faced with a difficult situation and had a choice to make. As Matthew tells us, he had decided to spare Mary shame and divorce her quietly as was expected of a righteous man of his time, however, this is not what God had in mind for Joseph. Instead, God invites Joseph to act beyond the rules of society. Faith often requires of us to act beyond the accepted rules of society, yet this is not always an easy decision, remember, even Joseph needed encouragement from God before he was ready to accept the path God dreamt for him. As society continues to evolve and challenge people of faith, this is particularly important for us as we reflect on what God may be calling us to do.

God calls us out of our comfort zones, and this often presents in the everyday actions of our lives; we do not need a big significant event to be out of our comfort zone, it may be as simple as trying a new routine or habit within our family that strengthens our faith. May we have the courage and faith to allow God's voice to be louder than the rationality and logic of the rules of society and see the fruits of trusting in the plans that God has for us.
